

From The Pastor's Desk...

The Epistle of St. Paul's

When you think of November, what comes to mind? As I write this, it is mid-October, and the Christmas decorations have been in storage for weeks. Once upon a time, in a land close at hand, November was about the lead-up to Thanksgiving. Christmas was held at bay until the weekend after Thanksgiving. So, what are you thinking about as November begins?

I am thinking about the lives that will be touched by the ministries of our congregation. I am thinking about the four years we've shared together since Belinda and I first arrived in Boulder. I am thinking about the differences we have, and the common bond we share as the people of God. I know I can't do anything about stopping or even slowing the secular observance of football, shopping, and the like, the things that pass for "important" in our culture. What I can do is remember that each day is a gift from God, and every day is a day of Thanksgiving to our God.

Instead of lamenting the state of the world with its unending litany of disasters, unrest, or controversy, perhaps it might be better to offer a litany of praise to God. What's that, you might ask, despite everything, we're supposed to offer praise to God? That's exactly what I'm suggesting we do.

"Now thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices, who wondrous things has done, in whom this world rejoices; who from our mothers' arms has blessed us on our way with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today." (Martin Rinkart, 1636, The United Methodist Hymnal, #102)

Our litany of praise might begin by giving thanks to our God for the gift of life and for finding ourselves participants in the ongoing act of creation. We might give thanks for our ability to share in the tasks of being in community.

"Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." –attributed to John Wesley

We could then ask for the strength necessary to do one thing that would contribute to making our corner of the world a bit better. Doing what we can, not necessarily what we want, will go a long way to ushering in the Kingdom of God in our lifetime. One thing, be it a gentle word, an act of kindness, or a moment of thanksgiving, provides the foundation for the next "one thing" and our growing deeper in love with God. The list of "one things" will be surprising in its variety and its length.

"Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible." -Francis of Assisi

We bring our litary to a conclusion by offering our affirmation that we have eliminated the things that serve as barriers to our relationship with God and with our neighbors. By eliminating these supposedly impossible barriers, we are left with the only thing that is possible, and that is the truth that we are blessed when we offer the Gloria Patri: Glory be to the Father, and to the Son: and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be: world without end. Amen.
