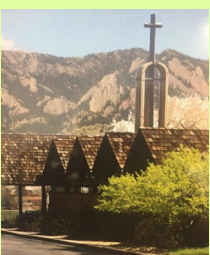

From The Pastor's Desk...

It occurred to me recently that with the significant changes in demographics at St. Paul's, it might be time to examine which community we are serving. Looking through the church directory, I noticed that there are thirty-eight Boulder addresses and thirty-seven addresses between Longmont and Golden. Additionally, there are eleven addresses outside of Colorado. We are predominately a congregation comprised of older adults. We are exclusively a congregation of one skin hue. What does this mean for us as we move forward into the God-shaped future that awaits us?

It is time for us to redefine what it means to be church and to recognize that the era in which we find ourselves bears little resemblance to the storied past of St. Paul's UMC. We can appreciate and honor the ministries of our community that have touched so many lives and the special memories of people who once filled the pews and classrooms. We can honor the past while recognizing that we are called to the Christian life in the 21st century and that this will require us to adopt a radical understanding of our purpose and our commitment to ministry together.

When responding to critics of his radical methods of ministry, John Wesley said, *"I look upon all the world as my parish; thus far I mean, that, in whatever part of it I am, [it is my] duty to declare unto all that are willing to hear, the glad tidings of salvation. This is the work which I know God has called me to; and sure I am that His blessing attends it"* (from Wesley's journal entry on 11 June 1739).

The United Methodist church makes this statement: "It is recommended that our statement of Social Principles be continually available to United Methodist Christians and that it be emphasized regularly in every congregation. It is further recommended that 'Our Social Creed' be frequently used in Sunday worship."

We believe in God, Creator of the world, and in Jesus Christ, the Redeemer of creation. **We** believe in the Holy Spirit, through whom we acknowledge God's gifts, and we repent of our sin in misusing these gifts to idolatrous ends. **We** affirm the natural world as God's handiwork and dedicate ourselves to its preservation, enhancement, and faithful use by humankind. **We** joyfully receive for ourselves and others the blessings of community, sexuality, marriage, and the family. **We** commit ourselves to the rights of men, women, children, youth, young adults, the aging, and people with disabilities; to improvement of the quality of life; and to the rights and dignity of all persons. **We** believe in the right and duty of persons to work for the glory of God and the good of themselves and others and in the protection of their welfare in so doing; in the rights to property as a trust from God, collective bargaining, and responsible consumption; and in the elimination of economic and social distress. **We** dedicate ourselves to peace throughout the world, to the rule of justice and law among nations, and to individual freedom for all people of the world. **We** believe in the present and final triumph of God's Word in human affairs and gladly accept our commission to manifest the life of the gospel in the world. Amen.

So, are you ready to become a radical disciple of Jesus, ready to do your part to transform the world beginning in whatever neighborhood you happen live in and here at St. Paul's? I believe we were called for just such a time as this!

A money-saving tip from your friendly Financial Secretaries: Choose the ACH transaction option rather than using your credit/debit card when utilizing online giving. An ACH transaction is actually a safer and more secure option for you! For example, a \$300 ACH donation has a fee of \$3.27 attached to it, whereas a \$300 credit/debit card donation incurs a \$9.27 fee—a difference of \$72 over a year. An even less-expensive method of making your donation to St. Paul's is to contact your bank to set up an auto-draft payment to the church. You can set that up as a monthly payment, on the same date each month, and the check will be automatically mailed to the church. Most banks love this type of transaction and do not charge a fee for this service. You can usually find this option under "bill pay" or "auto draft" on your bank's website.
